



ATTENDANCE

- Research relates that academic achievement is directly correlated to attendance.
- For some student populations, missing even one day a month can have a measurable effect on their achievement.
- I day/mo absence has no measurable effect; however, even 2 days/mo can(!)
- We take attendance every period. Our attendance will be reported on our CIP.
- All extended absences must be requested and approved by the Principal.
- Extended elective absences are NOT EXCUSED and if greater than 19 days, we are require to remove your child from our school. We can reinstate upon return though we lose FTE as a result of the reduced number of students.

ATTENDANCE

- I unexcused absent/mo: Inform parents in writing or by phone.
- 2 unexcused absences/mo: Inform parents for a need to conference
- 5 unexcused absences/mo: Inform parents of need to make a contract and refer to Truancy Board (CTB).
- 7 unexcused absences/mo: File Truancy Petition
- 10 unexcused absences/year: File truancy petition.
- 3 extreme tardies (>20 min into class) = I full unexcused absence.
- Pro-tip: Call in and have your child's absences excused.


CURRICULUM NIGHT

DRESS CODE

Upper TORSO

FEET

Footwear must be worn at all times and be appropriate to the activity.

Additional Guidelines
